

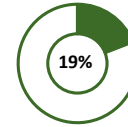
These dashboards reflect selected regional sectoral indicators on the humanitarian and resilience responses of more than 240 partners involved in the 3RP Inter-Agency Appeal in Egypt, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon and Turkey. Achievements are regionally aggregated and cumulative from the start of 2017 and targets are based on full funding of the 3RP 2017 and an expected population of 4.7 million refugees by end-2017.

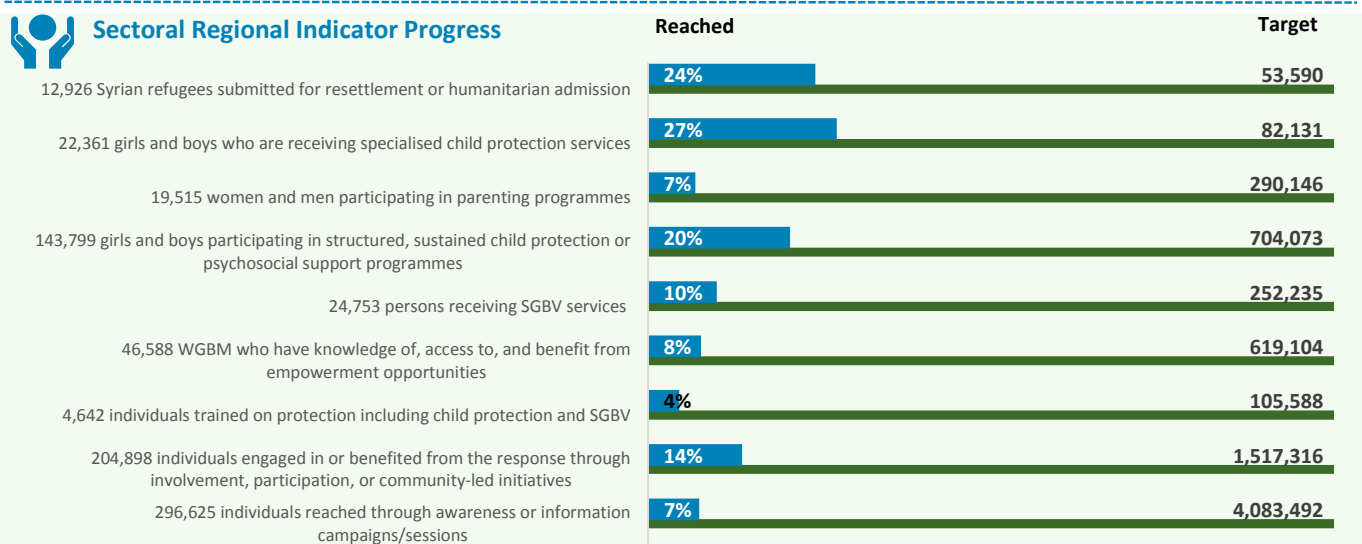
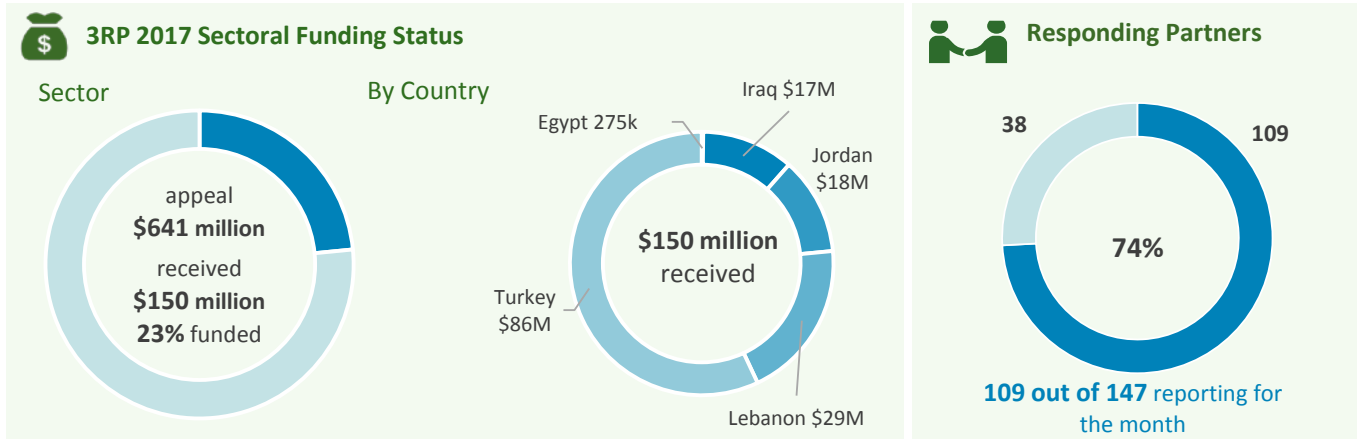
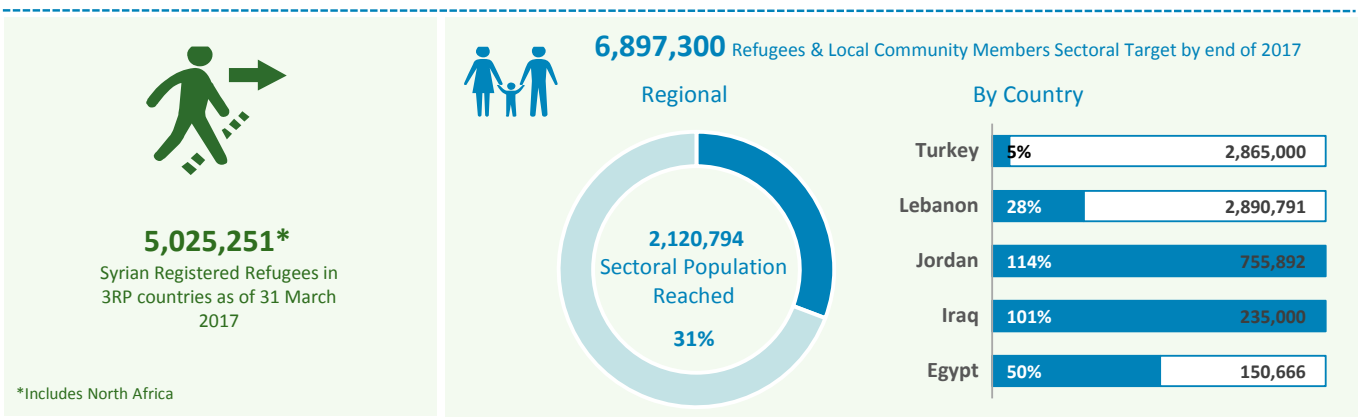

As the Syria crisis entered its seventh year in March, the number of Syrian refugees in the region passed the five million mark. There are now almost 2.97 million Syrian refugees registered refugees in Turkey, over 1 million in Lebanon, some 658,000 in Jordan, almost 237,000 in Iraq and above 120,000 in Egypt, indicating the generosity of countries across the region.

The total net increase since 1 January 2017 is 189,097 refugees, mostly due to registration of Syrian refugees who had already been residing in Turkey. This indicates that, despite the ongoing violence inside Syria, few Syrians are currently able to reach neighbouring countries, illustrating the ongoing management of borders across the region. Humanitarian partners call for respect of basic rights, protection and physical security of all populations, including those stranded at borders.

Nearly, 48 per cent of the Syrian refugee population are children, and 49 per cent are adult. 3RP Partners have established a regional strategic age and gender sensitive approach for preventing and responding to SGBV and child protection that prioritizes the promotion of gender equality in national legislation as well as in humanitarian programming. The approach aims at strengthening national systems and capacity to support SGBV survivors, promoting community-based initiatives within a coordinated inter-agency response. Efforts are in place to the improvement of data collection and analysis to ensure this response remains grounded in evidence.

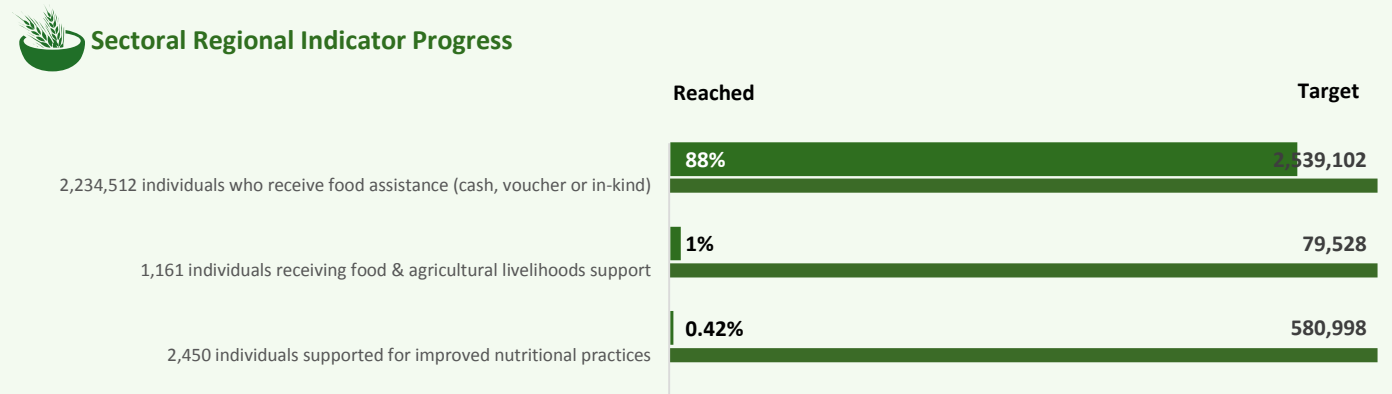
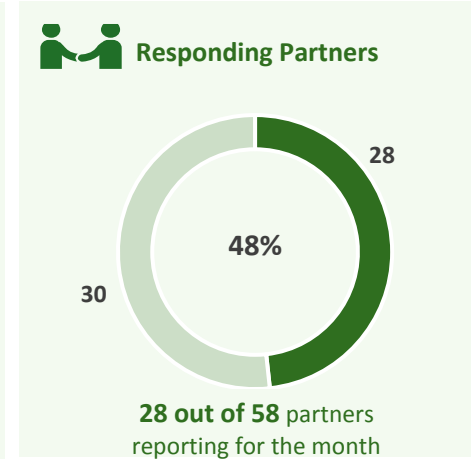
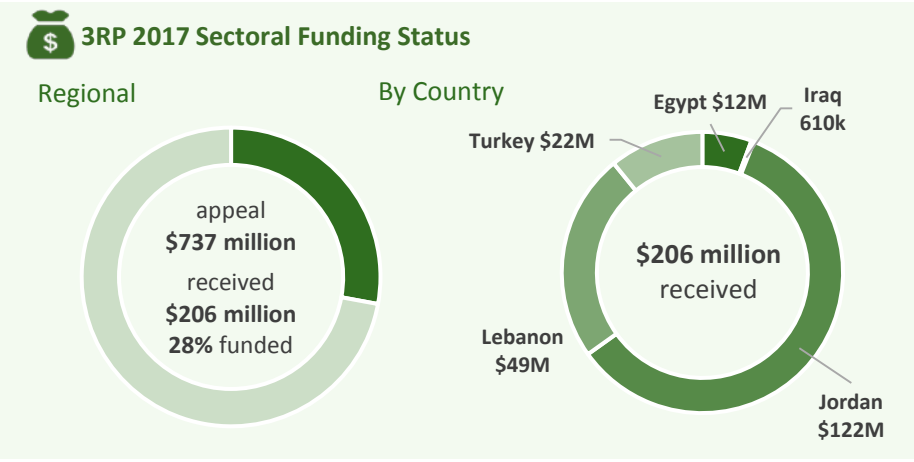
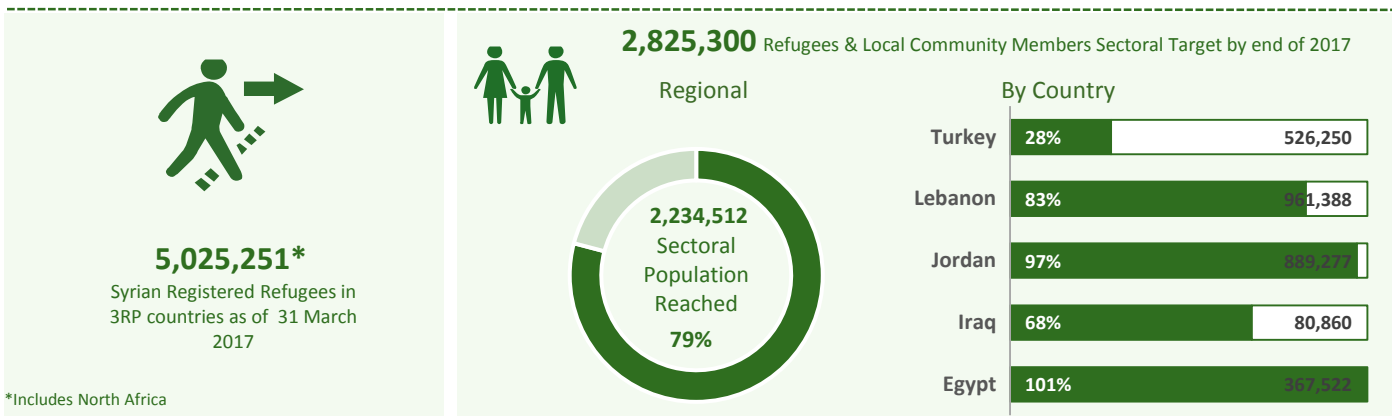

Food Security Partners continue to advocate for the role of the Sector as a foundation and enabler for achieving better outcomes in other sectors such as livelihoods and education. Crucial is the continuation of the partnership-based approach that focuses on building joint programming from the design phase, harnessing the comparative advantages of various stakeholders, avoiding overlap in programmes and improving cost-efficiency and accountability. Vital for achieving these outcomes is a continuation and increase in multi-year, flexible funding that allows for longer-term planning.

The latest reports released during the reporting period showed that in December 2016 food security in the region was stable compared to the previous quarter: 78 percent of households surveyed had 'acceptable' food consumption scores. Jordan and Lebanon continue to have the highest proportion of beneficiaries in the 'poor' or 'borderline' food consumption groups. Food consumption in Turkey, Iraq and Egypt were stable compared to the previous quarter. In Lebanon, acceptable food consumption improved by 6 percentage points. As the conflict in Syria entered its seventh year in March, the number of registered Syrian refugees in neighbouring countries surpassed 5 million people of whom more than 48 per cent are children.

A total of 856,677 Syrian girls and boys across the region continued to have access to formal education in schools in camp and host communities, at the same time more than 31,000 Syrian boys and girls are enrolled in informal or non-accredited education. Also during this period some 13,623 teachers and education personnel received incentives.

Notwithstanding, as of December 2016, there were over 534,000 children out of school. Underfunding, even if not an exclusive factor, has a major impact in the number of out of school children, which includes 367,000 out of school in Turkey, 127,000 in Lebanon, and 40,000 in Jordan. In Iraq and Egypt, all Syrian children had been reached by either formal or non-formal education (however this does not necessarily mean that all are attending

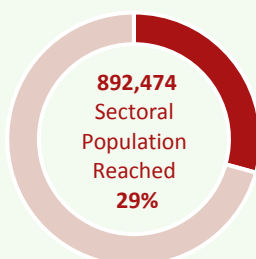
Syrian Registered Refugees in

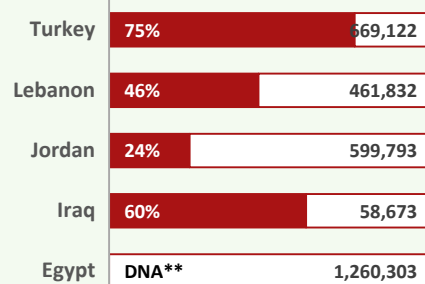

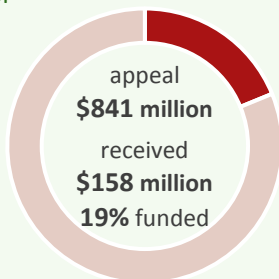

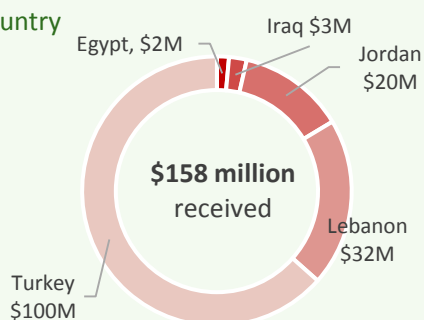


3RP 2017 Sectoral Funding Status

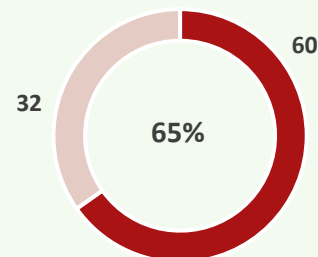

Demand for health services from Syrian refugees continues to place a large burden on national health systems across the region. The focus of the 3RP health strategy is twofold; strengthening the capacity of public health infrastructure to cope with the large caseload of Syrian refugees, and providing direct and targeted support to the most vulnerable populations who lack access to critical health services.

During the first quarter of 2017, 561,000 people received primary health care consultations, which represents 11 per cent of the overall target for 2017. Some 44,500 were referred to secondary or tertiary health care. Also during the same period of time more than 321,500 received vaccination.

At the end of the first quarter the Health Sector received 15 per cent of the required funds for 2017, this is USD 57 million of the required USD 373 million. Lack of funds reduces direct support for health services, and slows investment in resilient services.



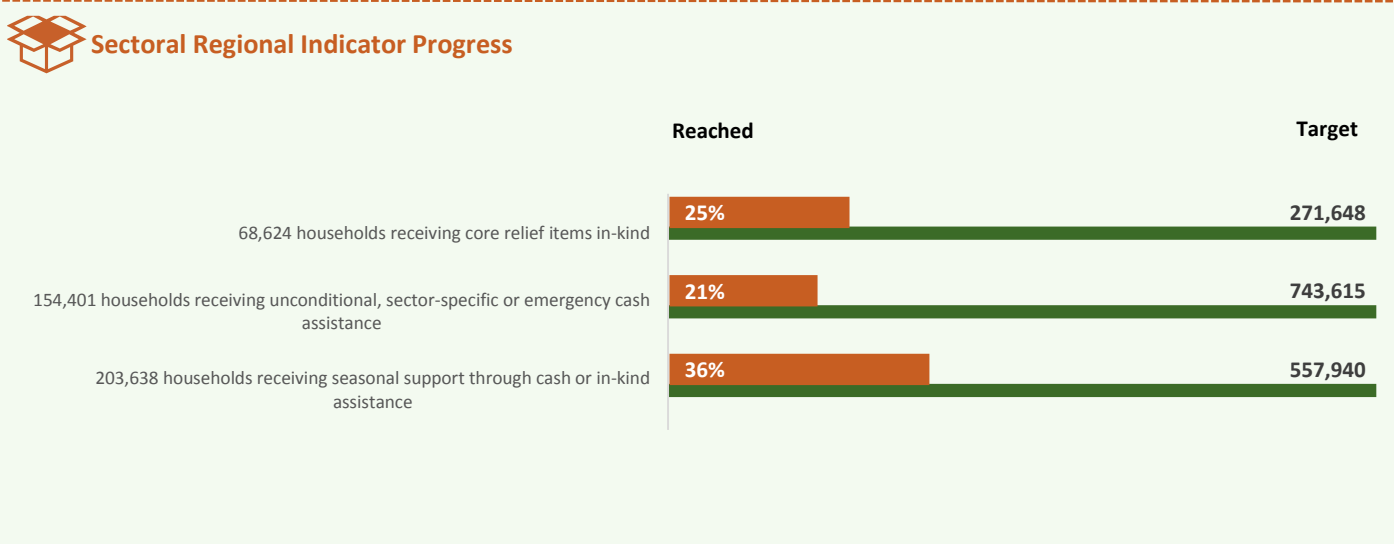
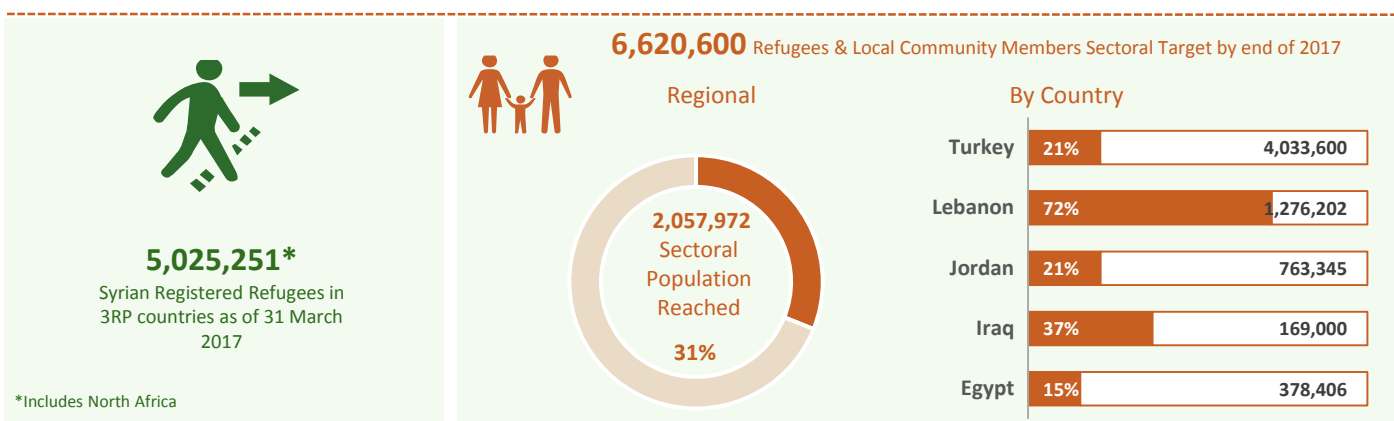

The continued strategic priority for the Sector is to provide assistance to meet the ongoing basic needs of Syrian refugees, based on a multi-sectoral household profiling and identification methodology, specific to each country.

During the first quarter of this year, the Basic Needs Sector reached over 154,000 households with unconditional, sector-specific or emergency cash assistance. In addition, 69,000 households received core relief items in-kind.

The Basic Needs Sector is the second-least funded sector at the end of the first quarter with only 10 per cent of the required funds received. This underfunding is expected to have a negative impact on the ability of Sector Partners to provide assistance, particularly vital cash assistance programmes supporting vulnerable refugee families to meet their basic household needs. If further funds are not forthcoming Sector Partners will have to scale back or suspend programmes in the second half of 2017.

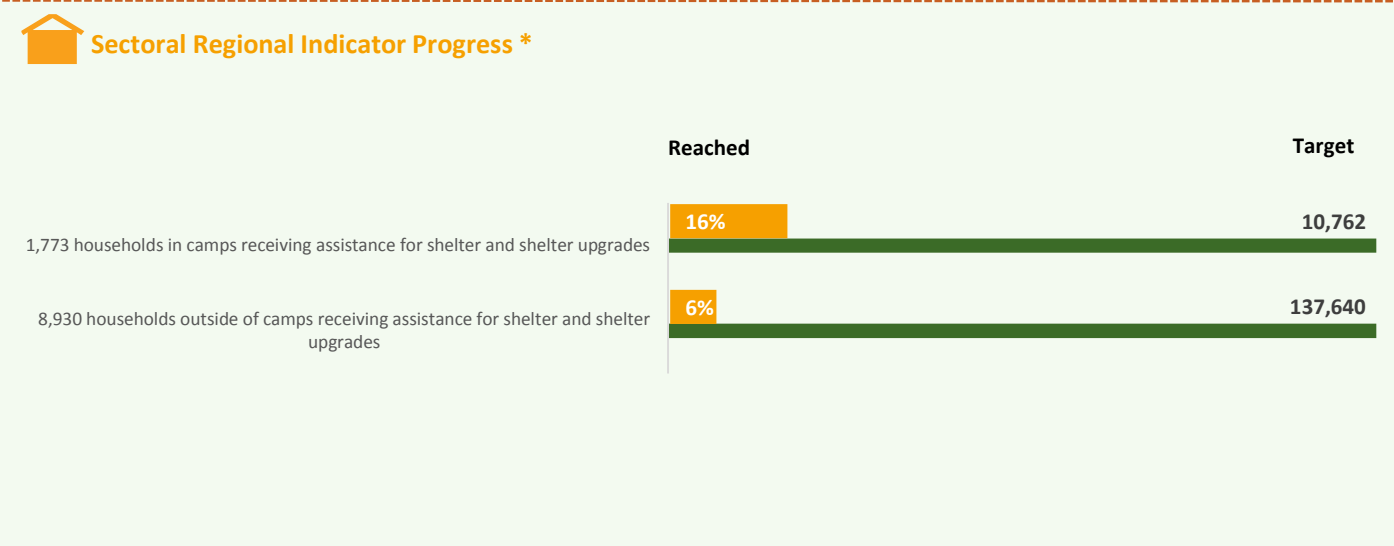
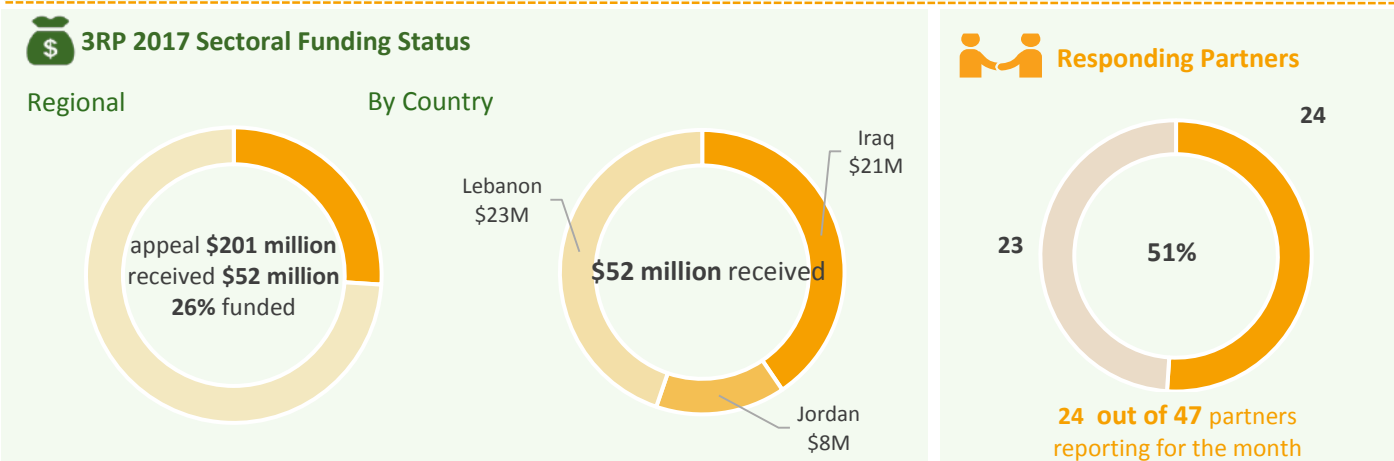
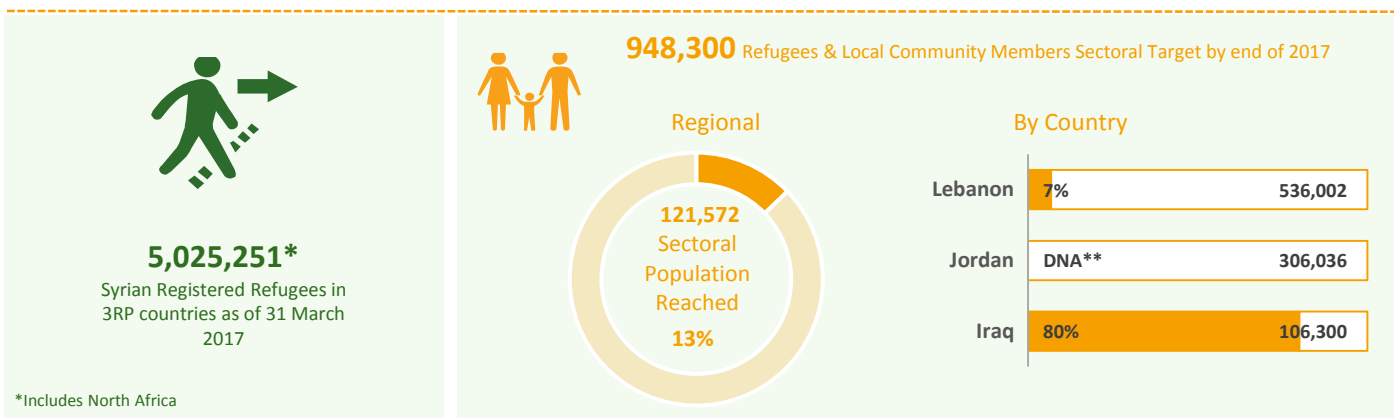

The Shelter Sector priority remains to ensure adequate, affordable and sustainable housing options, primarily for refugees living in urban, peri-urban and rural areas, but also for vulnerable host community members. The Sector continues to move towards support to refugees in urban locations being based upon the inter-agency vulnerability analysis of families.

In the region, only 10 per cent of the Syrian refugees live in camps while the majority (90 per cent) live in urban settings, in non-functional public buildings, collective centres, and informal types of settlements. Shelter assistance for the vulnerable families also form a major component of the assistance provided during the winter months.

With just over a quarter of the required funding received, the Shelter Sector during the first three months of the year reached almost 11,000 households inside and outside camps with shelter assistance and shelter upgrades.

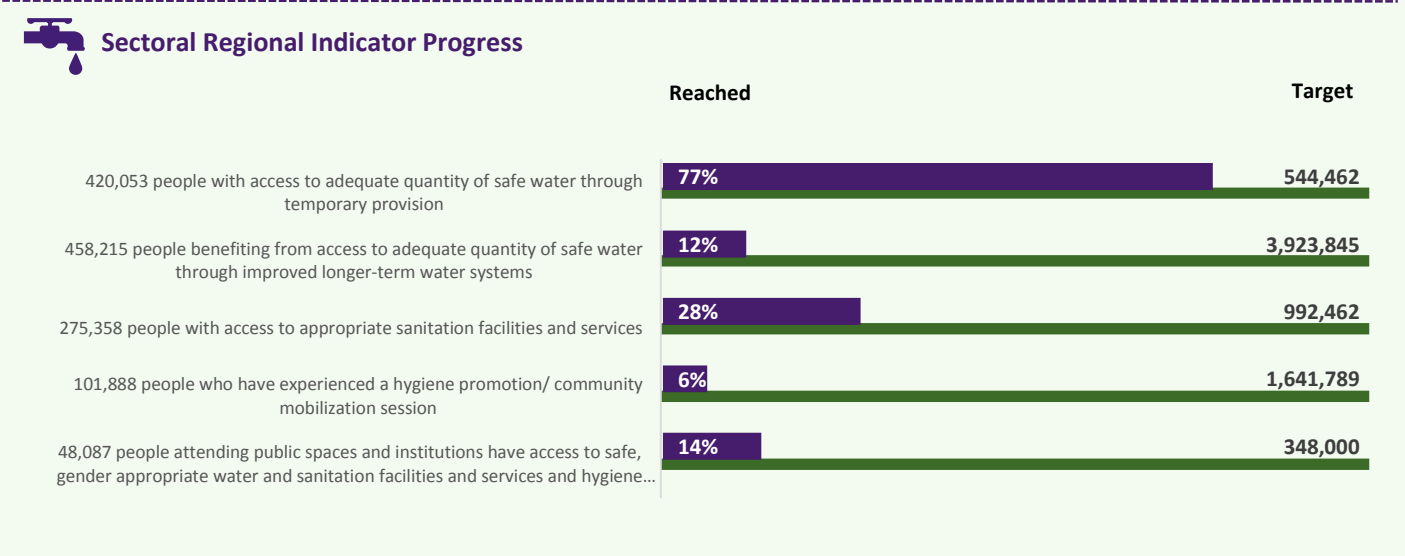
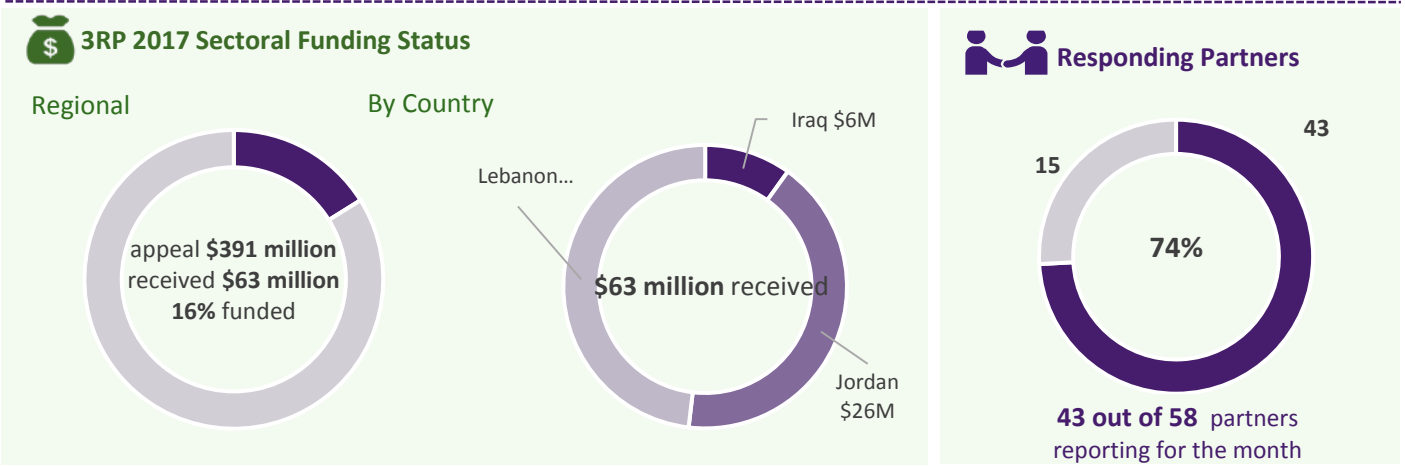
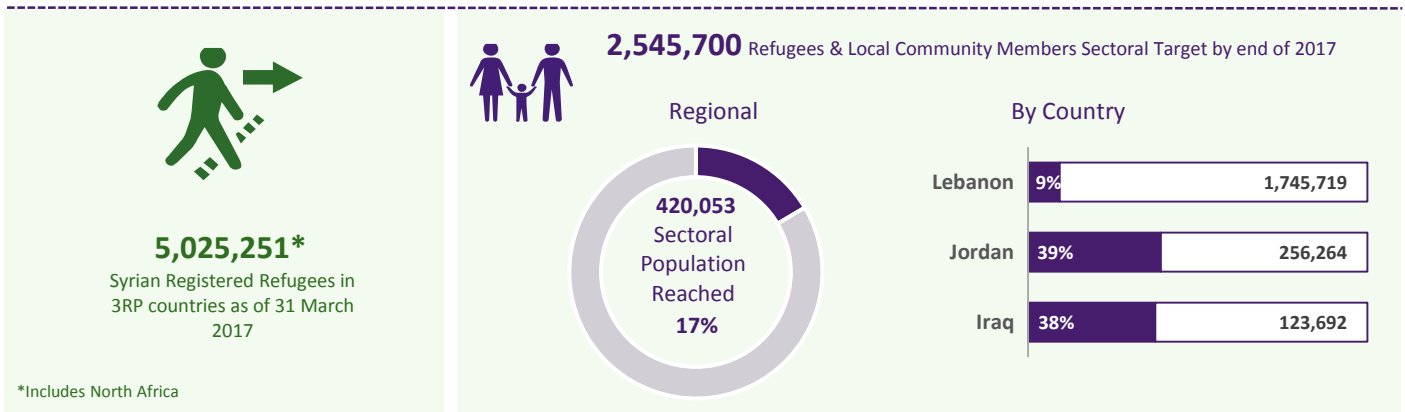

The overarching goal of the WASH Sector is to enhance more sustainable and cost-effective WASH services for the Syrians living in camps/settlements and having more efficient, cost-effective and equity-driven service providers in areas with a significant proportion of Syrians living in host communities.

With the sector only 16 per cent funded as at the end of the first quarter of 2017, WASH Partners were able to reach over 100,000 people with hygiene promotion awareness sessions and messaging, and to assist over 275,000 people to access appropriate sanitation facilities. Over 458,000 individuals benefited from access to adequate quantity of safe water through improved longer-term water systems.

As an example of these longer-term interventions, construction works for Phase II of the the Zaatari camp water and wastewater network project commenced in Jordan. The works include the main sewer lines and infrastructure of the wastewater network, and the secondary and tertiary lines. Azraq water network improvement works continued with planned completion, and subsequent end of water tankering, expected in May.

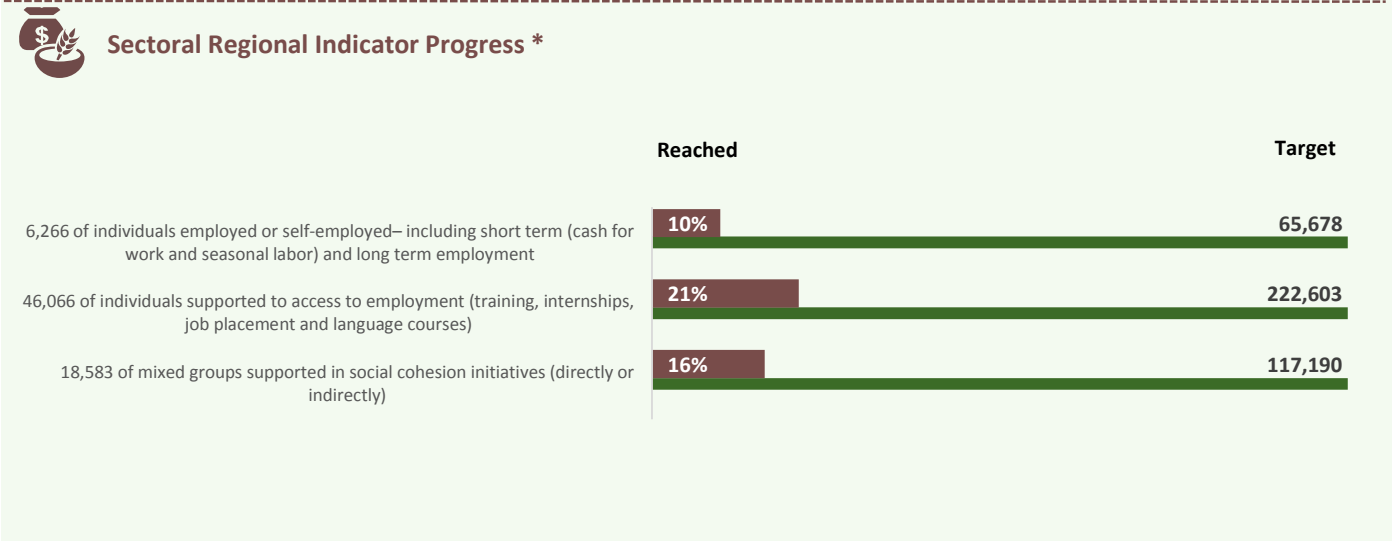
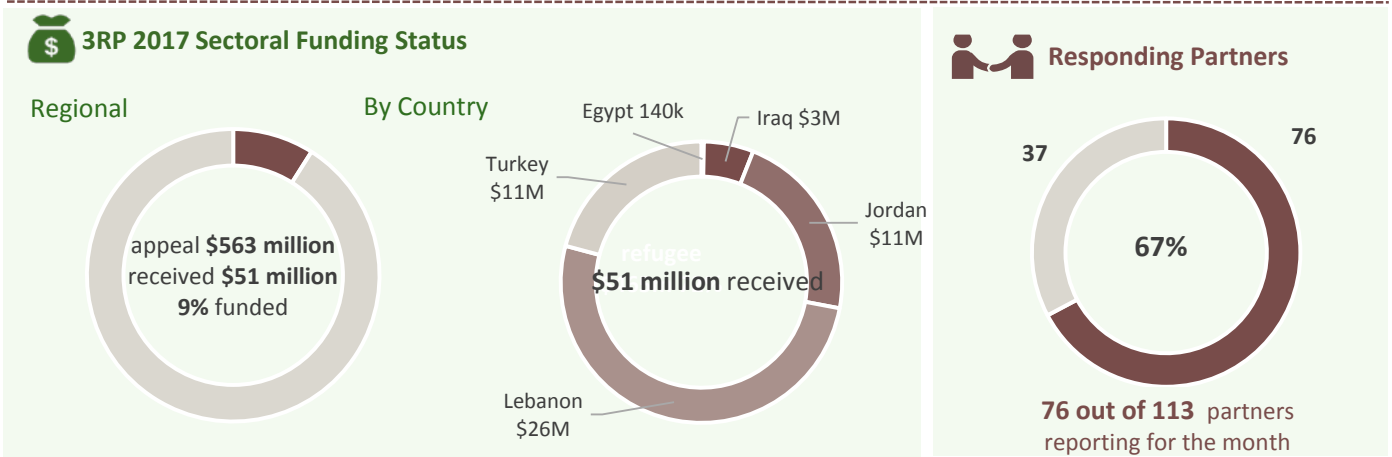
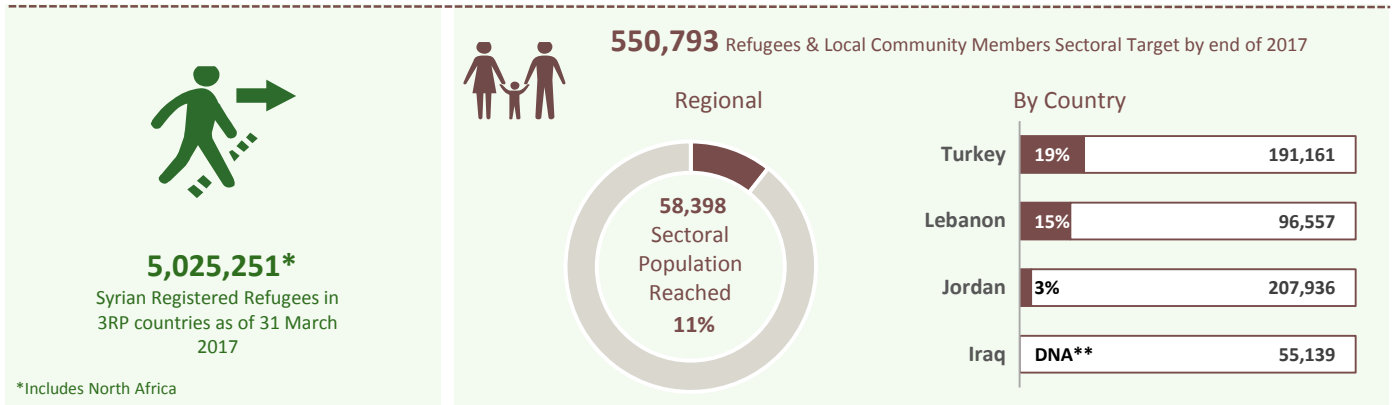

During the first quarter of 2017, the Livelihoods Partners assisted a total of 6,266 refugees and host community members with short-term and/or long-term employment opportunities and 46,066 youth and adults in increasing their employability through job training, internships, job placement and language courses. Eighty per cent of the enrolment in skills and language training are from Turkey, where the recently established vocational training centre in the organized industrial zone in Gaziantep became operational and vocational training courses have been provided to Syrian refugees and host community members.

In Egypt, partnership with the Social Fund for Development (SFD) continues to create employment opportunities and to build the capacities and skills of unemployed youth to be, while improving community infrastructure and social services. In addition, 18,583 refugees and host community members participated in social cohesion initiatives.

In Jordan, through Skills Exchange project, Syrian refugees share their skills with Jordanians. This project not only economically support Syrians and boost their economic stability, it also helps Jordanians to see how Syrian refugees contribute to their community. Furthermore, multi-country economic assessment, "Jobs Make the Difference: Expanding Economic Opportunities for Syrian Refugees and Host Communities," which provides programmatic, empirically grounded evidence to support job creation efforts in the sub-region, was released at the Brussels conference on 04 April, 2017.
